A Revision of the Ruffed Grouse. *Condor*, 45 (3): 85-103, May-June 1943.—Twelve subspecies recognized; Philadelphia designated as type locality of Eastern Ruffed Grouse (*Bonasa umbellus umbellus*) which ranges from eastern and central Massachusetts to central Pennsylvania and south to Cape May, N. J. It intergrades with the darker Appalachian Ruffed Grouse (*B. u. monticola*) in east central Pennsylvania.

- CHRISTMAS COUNT. *Audubon Magazine*, 45 (1): January-February 1943, Supplement.—Sixteen reports from Pennsylvania, twelve from New Jersey, and one from Delaware.

- CRAIG, WALLACE. The Song of the Wood Pewee (*Myiochanes virens* Linnaeus): A Study of Bird Music. *N. Y. State Museum Bulletin No. 334*, 186 p., June 1943.
- DUMONT, PHILIP A. Blue Geese on National Wildlife Refuges of the Atlantic Coast, Winter of 1941-'42. *Auk*, 60 (1): 109-110, January 1943.—Largest Blue Goose flock on Coast—45—at Brigantine; 18 Blue Geese and an estimated 12,000 Snow Geese at Bombay Hook.
- GROFF, CHARLES W. The Farmer Takes an Owl. *Nature Magazine*, 36 (3): 142-143, ill., March 1943.—Successful transfer of a Lancaster County Barn Owl family from storm-destroyed tree to improvised box nest.
- GROSKIN, HORACE. Scarlet Tanagers 'Anting'. *Auk*, 60 (1): 55-59, January 1943.—Anting by two tanagers closely observed for one hour. Other articles by Nichols and Van Tyne describe anting by Robins and a Towhee.
