JANUARY 8, 1976. Fifty-six members and two guests were present at the Club's eighty-sixth annual meeting.

Dr. George B. Reynard was elected an Honorary Member of the Club. Richard Mellon, Dr. Keith Richards, Elmer Rowley, and Keith Seager were elected Fellows. Whitson Fowler was elected active membership.

The Club's annual Julian K. Potter award for outstanding work in field ornithology was presented to Alan Brady. Dr. Ernest A. Choate was the recipient of the Club's Witmer Stone award.

Reports were made on a number of area Christmas Counts. Among the highlights were a Green-tailed Towhee in Gloucester County, a Western Kingbird, both crossbills, and both eiders at Cape May, and Marbled Godwit and Dickcissel at Brigantine.

The traditional refreshments capped the evening's activities.

JANUARY 15. Forty-two members and four guests were present.

The program of the evening consisted of the Club's annual slide contest. Winners in the three categories of Birds, Natural History, and Scenes were, respectively, William Middleton, Richard Bell, and Wesley Doughty.

FEBRUARY 5. Thirty-five members and four guests were present.

Announcement was made of the death on January 26 of former Club member Raymond T. Bye.

Dr. Keith Richards presented an identification program, illustrating his talk with skins. Comparisons were made between such species as Audubon's and Manx Shearwaters, American and European Golden Plovers, Horned and Eared Grebes, as well as loons and petrels.

FEBRUARY 19. Fifty-two members and seven guests attended.

Alva Collins was elected to active membership.

Reports were made on two recent field trips. A group of Pine Grosbeaks and 13 Rough-legged Hawks were the highlights on the February 7-8 Poconos weekend. In New England on the following weekend Club members recorded Red-necked Grebe, Barrow's Goldeneye, Harlequin Duck, Black-headed Gull, Little Gull, Black Guillemot, Thick-billed Murre, Snowy Owl, Bohemian Waxwing, Common Redpoll, and Green-tailed Towhee.

Richard Walter presented the evening program on Australia. He had an excellent series of slides taken on a trip to northeastern Australia in late 1974. Many birds typical of the area were featured.

MARCH 4. Forty-two members and three guests attended.

Dr. Keith Richards reported on the February 29 field trip to Bombay Hook Refuge. Highlights included a large number of hawks and a group of some 25 Brewer's Blackbirds.

The program of the evening was a fine slide presentation by Richard Mellon on Bowman's Hill. Wildflowers were featured. Activities of the nature center there were discussed.

MARCH 18. Forty-eight members and four guests were in attendance.

Robert Mangold, a biologist with the N.J. Fish and Game Department, gave an excellent presentation with color slides on the New Jersey salt marshes and the Clapper Rail. An extensive question and answer period afterwards was evidence of the membership's interest.

APRIL 1. Sixty-six members and three guests attended.

Edwin Johnson and Brian Moscatello were elected to active membership.

Report was made on the recent Club trip to Gloucester County. Three Saw-whet Owls and a large number of Whistling Swans were among the highlights.

The evening's program on South Africa was presented by Dr. Ernest Choate. Dr. Choate gave an interesting historical account of the region before showing his excellent series of slides on flowers, birds, and general scenery.

APRIL 15. Fifty-five members and four guests were present.

The program of the evening was presented by biologist Otto Heck. His interesting discussion of comparative studies of Great Horned Owls in rural vs. suburban areas was illustrated with a fine series of color slides.
