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The first four issues were published as *Abstracts of the Proceedings of the Delaware Valley Ornithological Club*. The title *Cassinia* was adopted with Volume 5 in 1901.

There have been three prior indices to *Cassinia*. These include one in 1944, a supplementary index in 1958 and one in 1971-72 which covered the years from 1890 to 1970. The current index has been greatly expanded from previous efforts. Every article and general or field note has been listed. All locations and species referred to in titles have been listed.

It is important to understand that the year references in the index refer to the year on the title page, not to that on the cover. The two do not always agree. In addition, Volume 39, published in 1953, covering the years 1951-52, has no year or volume number indicated on the title page, so is referred to in this index as 1951-52. Volume 40, published in 1955, covering 1952-53, is incorrectly labeled Volume 39 on its title page. It has the year 1953 on its title page, therefore it is referred to as 1953 in this index.

Titles of articles are listed in *italics*. Titles of selections from *General Notes* or *Field Notes* are listed in normal type. Each *article* is listed by its title, under its author (by title) and referenced under subject. *General Notes* and *Field Notes* are listed under the author (by title), referenced under subject, but not listed separately as are articles.

Example: The article, *Birds of Tincum*, by John Miller and Charles Price, on page 3 from 1959, is listed as *Birds of Tincum* under "B," under Miller, John C., under Price, Charles E. Jr. and it is referenced only as 1959:3 under Tincum National Environmental Center. On the other hand, the General Note, American Coot Nesting in the Tincum Area, is not listed under "A," but is listed by title (in normal type) under Miller, John C., and referenced as 1979:22 under Coot, American and under Tincum National Environmental Center.

A reference directly following a person's name is usually an obituary. Species references without a location specified refer to behavior or general distribution. Common and scientific names used in titles are presented as in the original manuscript, but modern common names are used as subjects.

No attempt was made to find all references to all species. Species references are only listed for those articles or notes for which they are the prime focus. Twenty-two of the first thirty volumes had indices listing every reference for every species in each volume. (see *Index* below for listing of these volume numbers).

As with species, locations are referenced only for those mentioned in titles. All locations mentioned are listed individually and under the appropriate state.

Each entry has been checked against the actual article in *Cassinia* and corrections have been made to errors and omissions in past indices.

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
